Role Purpose:	Helping make the Thackeray Collection accessible to the public by cataloguing and classifying a variety of materials.

Why We Want You:	The Charterhouse has had a long and remarkable history from the mid-14 <sup>th</sup> century to the present day, as a Carthusian monastery, Tudor mansion, Victorian school and almshouse. Our incredible site has also borne witness to key events such as the Black Death, Henry VIII's dissolution of the monasteries, the Civil War and Second World War.

	The collection was left to the Charterhouse on the death of James A. Waley-Cohen in 1963. It consists of around 500 books and journals; two boxes of sketches and letters by the author educated at Charterhouse School; and some cartoons by John Leech who illustrated many of Thackeray's novels.
	The Waley-Cohen collection has recently been relocated to two dedicated study rooms where it will be accessible to researchers. In preparation for this, volunteers will be instrumental in ensuring that all records are kept up to date, so future users can access the varied resources of the collection.
Notes:	We will reimburse volunteers for lunch and travel expenses up to £10 per day and provide refreshments in break times.
