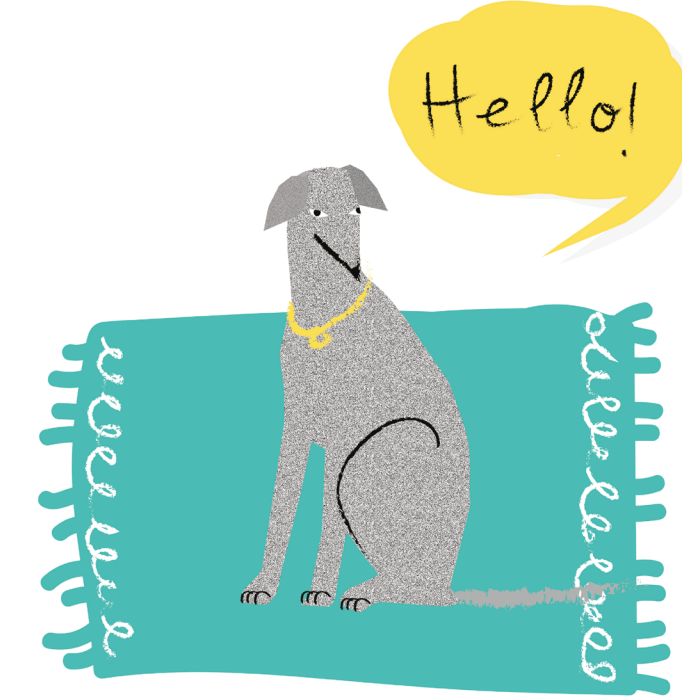


YOUR NAME _____

MUSEUM

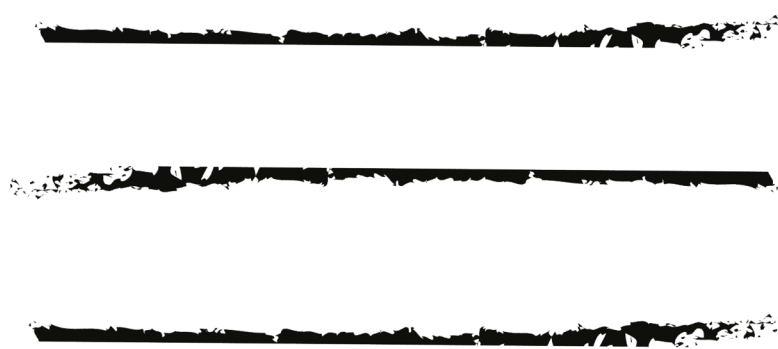
I made lots of money from selling coal. Make different marks with your pencil in these pieces of coal.

MUSEUM

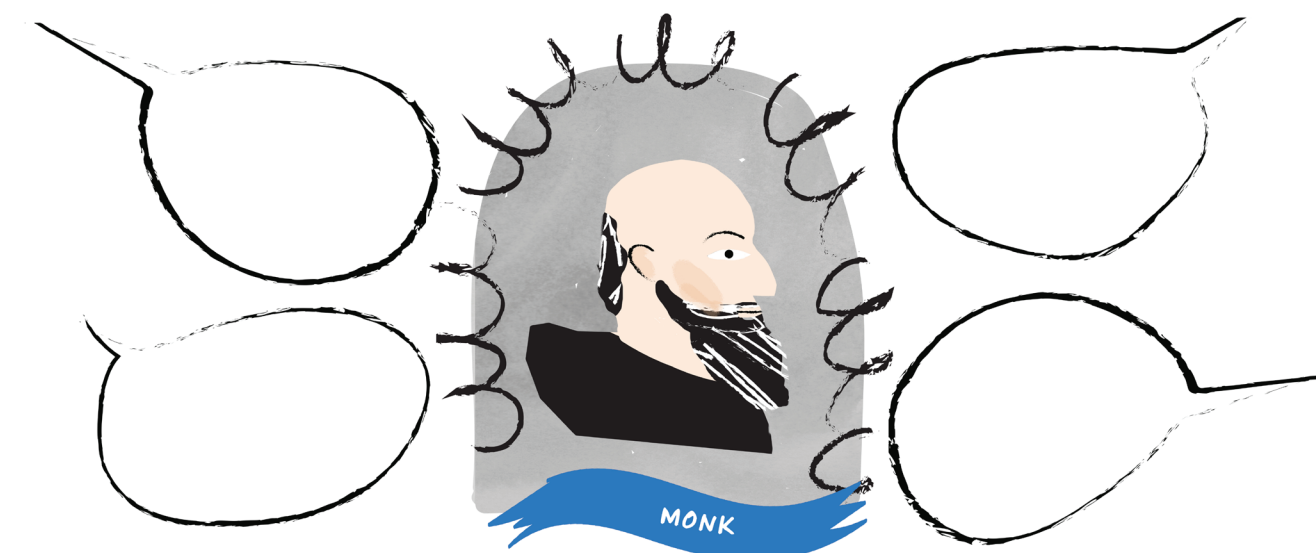
Create your own archaeological museum display. Design and draw the missing parts to make the objects whole.

Draw Thomas the Talbot's head on this pew end.

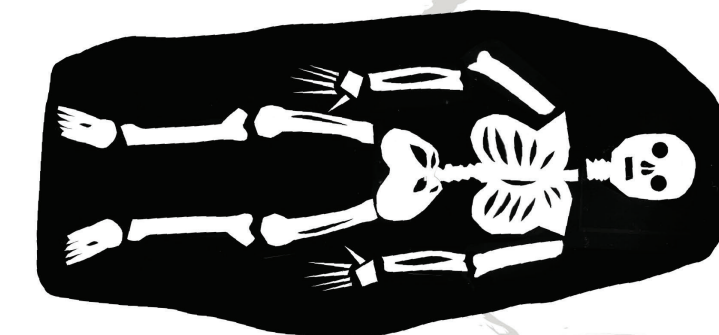
How many of my heads can you find in the chapel?
